THE advent of the fourth year of publication finds the ST. JOHN'S LAW REVIEW more firmly established. In accordance with the Articles of Association, adopted at the close of the last academic year, the membership has been raised to the maximum—twenty-five in number. Efforts have been directed toward a true departmentalization of the responsibilities, and the personnel of the Editorial Board and Staff has been conducive to successful results in this respect. The responsibility for the content of each section rests primarily with the respective editors, the Editor and Associate exercising only general supervision.

The present issue marks the initiation of a new section — Tax Comment — under the editorship of Emanuel Schneider. Professor Benjamin Harrow, A.B., J.D., C.P.A., of the Graduate School, has consented to act as advisor and the REVIEW gratefully acknowledges his aid and co-operation in an undertaking which, we believe, will become an important and interesting feature of our publication. Certainly the construction and application of the laws of taxation offer ample opportunity for close analysis and commentary, which because of the importance of the subject, should prove invaluable.

The new home of the Law School has afforded additional facilities, which, together with the greater co-operation on the part of the School Administration, aids greatly in the work of the REVIEW.

The REVIEW has felt free to call upon the faculty for advice and counsel, and the privilege accorded has not been without its use, but in accordance with our policy, the work is entirely that of the representatives of the student body who comprise the Editorial Board and Staff.

The REVIEW takes this occasion to offer its felicitations and good wishes to Honorable Charles J. Dodd of the Board of Trustees, who will shortly assume his duties as a member of the Judiciary of the State of New York.
